

VOLUNTEERS SERVE IN EDUCATION



Dave is presently the Sunday school superintendent.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM INITIATED

With the completion of the dining hall at Cachipay, concern grew for another community need - proper nutrition of the children. That most of the school children were not eating properly became apparent upon careful observation. Since the school is located one mile from Cachipay, the children would either run home for lunch, bring a small lunch to school or go without. Many of the children showed signs of malnutrition.



Consequently, at the end of August a school lunch program was initiated. CARE has donated flour, powdered milk and oil. Meals including meat, vegetables, milk and bread have been served for the equivalent of seven-and-a-half cents daily. Children from the neighboring community school are also participating in the program.

These have been months of experimentation, improving services and organization, ironing out difficulties. It is still too early to properly evaluate the success of the program, but there are two favorable signs. One is the way the Parents-Teachers Association is taking the initiative and making plans to begin a garden to supply more vegetables for the meals. Another is best illustrated by a comment overheard recently, "Have you noticed how fat the children are becoming?"

Rev. Vernon Wiebe and Rev. J. H. Epp from Hillsboro, Kansas, visited with Armando Hernandez and Glendon Klaassen in Bogota the 20th of August. 


interest, however, on the part of both groups in some type of cooperative efforts in the future.



NEW WORKERS ARRIVE








LA MESA CHURCH PURCHASES PARSONAGE


COLOMBIAN PRESIDENT VISITS USA

FURTHER TRAINING THROUGH CORRESPONDENCE COURSES


The traditional Sunday worship and Sunday school programs, plus a mid-week service, generally do not adequately prepare the average Christian for active participation in the mission of the church. One help is through correspondence courses. Over a year ago a center for such studies was set up in Bogota with Mr. Jorge Manrique as director. Pastor Alfonso Castro of the Cachipay church has encouraged his congregation to participate in this form of study. On October 10 a group of 35, both young and old, received their first certificates of study, having completed the course on

The special service was one of great inspiration and joy, and many of the congregation plan to continue with the next course on the book of Acts. The church, as a result, feels a new sense of joy and meaning as individuals and even entire families take discipleship more seriously. 
