Glendon and Reitha Klaassen, young and enthusiastic missionaries of our mission, have accepted the challenge of directing the home and school in Cachipay. Their maturity and experience in Gulfport, Miss., and in the Normal School in Ibagué, well qualifies them to occupy and direct the "nerve center" of our school and of our mission activities in Colombia.

Hundreds of children and young people have come into contact with the gospel and have been influenced by the Holy Spirit to make their decisions for Christ in Cachipay. The school and retreat opportunities are limited only by the imagination.

During the last five years the Klaassens have made an outstanding contribution in the Normal School in Ibagué. Of their years there they write:

"When we moved to Ibagué in December 1960, we thought that our future years there would be significant because of a teaching ministry. Today as we pack up to leave we are sure that we've had a small but significant part in the Lord's work in Colombia, especially since one of the most pressing needs is the training of Christian national leaders.

"We have had the privilege and responsibility of teaching some 135 young people representing 12 different evangelical missions from all over Colombia. Of this number 57 have graduated and 19 have come from our Mennonite churches. We are deeply grateful to the Lord for the privilege and ministry that we have been permitted."

GEORGE AND MARGARET EDIGER IN COLOMBIA

A very happy and wonderful surprise came to the Colombian staff on August 21 when George and Margaret Ediger arrived in Bogotá. They have been manna from heaven and have been an answer to the prayers of many in behalf of the work in Colombia.

STUCKYS ACCEPT NEW ASSIGNMENT

In the first days of December Gerald and Mary Hope Stucky with their son Timothy left for the United States where Gerald will become the copastor of the First Mennonite Church in Berne, Ind.

Leaving Colombia, the Stuckys said: "We are deeply grateful to the Lord for the blessed years that He has permitted us to have in Colombia. We feel that we have received much more than we have been able to give.

"We have learned that the spiritual life is a wonderful adventure with God, not structured, static, and set--but mobile and that we are to be alert to the leadings of God.

"It would be easier to stay than to go. But we feel impelled by the Spirit to go-knowing that He has gone before us. We pray that we may be able to fulfill by His grace that task that He has set before us-and we have the confidence that He will at the same time strengthen and enlarge His program here in Colombia."

THE STRUGGLE TO BE AND TO BECOME

American boys and girls who often feel that school is a second-rate disaster, could hardly imagine the desperate struggle that tens of thousands of children in the have-not nations go through in order to have the privilege of studying and of having an education.

Small, and often undernourished—but wiry and plucky—children often walk 45 minutes to an hour to come to our school in Cachipay. The paths are rocky and very often muddy. Rains pour as if to rival Noah's flood, and the creeks are crossed by the use of a large log. But school starts at 7:50 a.m. and there they are with bright and shining faces.

To go to high school or to college remains only a dream for most youngsters in the primary school. They will never have the opportunity because they lack the money, or because there is insufficient room in the school.

Lydia Pinzon one of our grade school girls, after an immense effort has been able to graduate from the Presbyterian High School in Bogotá, has now been offered a \$2200 scholarship in the University of the Pacific in California. A Cinderella-type dream has come true!

In these meetings the blessing of God is prayed for and expected, but little did George anticipate the marvelous working of the Spirit that would take place that day in the dirt patio of a little home one block from the town center.

When George and his wife, accompanied by a group of Christian friends who had been witnessing to the family over a period of months, arrived at the home of the Gamboas, the husband left to invite some of his friends. Three men came: one, a storekeeper and leader in the community; another, a brother to a doctor; and a third, a farmer. After special music, George presented a message on John 3:16, trusting the Holy Spirit to overrule his errors in Spanish.

"Are some of you tired of your old life and want to have it changed?" he ended. "Claro! (Certainly)," responded Mr. Gamboa.

"Would others like to give your hearts to Christ and receive a new life from Him?" pursued George.

"Por supuesto! (Of course)," spoke up another man.

The wonderful experience of spiritual rebirth and renewal was recently witnessed in our school in Cachipay during special meetings with Mrs. Armando Hernandez of Ibagué. The messages were especially designed for young hearts, and the songs and the illustrated talks were very effective.

There is nothing static about the spiritual life of the children—it goes up and down, and there is much struggle. But each one is precious to the Lord. Do remember them in your prayers.




