

KLAASSENS TAKE YEAR FURLOUGH

On December 20, the Glen Klaassen family left Colombia for a one year furlough. This is the second furlough for the Klaassens who have been missionaries in Colombia for seven years.

During their first four years, Glen and Reitha served as teachers at the Normal School in Ibague. The major part of their second term was spent as the directors of the Colegio in Cachipay. Rev. Klaassen was named director of the Mission in 1965.

The Board of Missions and the Colombia staff have granted the Klaassens an extended furlough to provide them with the opportunity to pursue theological studies at the Mennonite Biblical Seminary in Elkhart, Indiana. The Klaassens are expected to move to the

Elkhart community following the Christmas holidays.

BETHEL COLLEGE COUPLE IN COLOMBIA



BOGOTA CHURCH LAYS THE FIRST STONE

In the sunshine and rain, the members of the Bogota Church, symbolically placed on their property a marble plaque, which officially initiated the beginning of the construction of the new church. The inscription on the marble stone reads: "THE FIRST EVANGELICAL MENNONITE CHURCH OF BOGOTA - Founded, May 24, 1964 - Dedicated to The Glory of God."

With nearly every church member present and over one hundred friends and special guests, the Bogota church realized the beginning of the construction of a new church building. Mr. Luis Correa directed the service. Several numbers of special music were presented by the staff and teachers of the Colegio Americano, and the choir of the Bogota church.

Rev. Glen Klaassen, director of the Mennonite Mission, spoke words of congratulations to the congregation. Mrs. Edilma Reales, member of the building committee, related some of the important decisions yet to be made and called upon each member to share in the building of the church. Rev. Howard Habegger spoke briefly then led the congregation in the ceremony of laying the first stone. The final choir hymn, building fund offering, and benediction were performed as rain began to fall. 

Two weeks following the laying of the first stone the actual construction began. Although Bogota is experiencing a severe rainy season, the construction at present is about one month ahead of schedule. The constructor and other building officials believe the entire project will be completed by May of 1967. It is the hope of the congregation that the dedication of the new facilities can take place in May of next year because it will mark the third anniversary of the founding of the church in Bogota.

Within the graduating class one boy expressed his desire to become a minister of the gospel. Another girl has made a definite decision to continue her schooling toward a profession in teaching.



The initiating force behind the conference was the Wycliffe Bible Translators, who are working among some twenty-five Indian tribes in Colombia. Wycliffe encouraged the evangelical church of Colombia to organize a follow-up program of evangelism and church outreach among the Indians. The conference formed


It was obvious that the children found a good friend in the American dentist, who not only extracted their teeth, but also found time to play basketball and other games.

MISSIONARY TOURS LOWER SOUTH AMERICA

During four weeks in October and November, Rev. Howard Habegger, missionary-pastor in Bogota, traveled fifteen thousand miles touring four countries of Lower South America.

Rev. Habegger gave a series of special messages at the Spiritual Emphasis Week at the Mennonite Theological Seminary in Montivideo, Uruguay. In Argentine, Rev. Habegger preached in several Old Mennonite Churches in Buenos Aires and Bragado. He also had the opportunity to visit the Mennonite Colonies in the Chaco of Paraguay and meet both church and colony leaders.

The final two weeks of the tour were spent in southern Brazil. Rev. Habegger visited the Mennonite Mission work in Sao Paulo and Campinas. During the thirty-four day tour, he spoke, preached, or related the mission work of Colombia

twenty-seven times. Rev. Habegger returned to Bogota on November 16.
