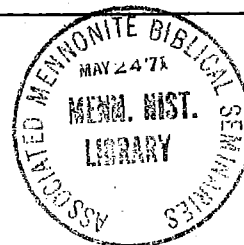

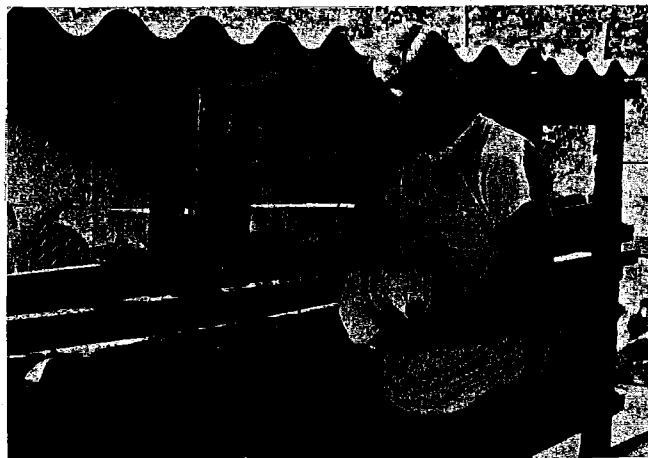
They shared in the work on a variety of fronts. Gene was active in the community development program, first with the road

NEW PROJECTS IN CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Bogota Mennonite Church appointed a committee of five to restudy its Christian Education Program. After much study and prayer, the following changes were presented to and accepted by the congregation:

1. To conduct separate Sunday morning worship services for the children and adults with a united worship service once a month.
2. To cancel the usual Sunday school hour and to teach Bible in the following ways:
 - a. Through graded children's Bible clubs which meet on Saturdays.
 - b. Through Bible camps, held at least twice a year for each age group.
 - c. Through short, intense Bible studies held on Sunday mornings at least twice a year.
 - d. Through the youth, women and men's organizations.

The new program, in effect for approximately four months, has created a great deal of interest and hard work for many members. In January we held our children's Bible camp. At the present time, we are planning a six-week, intense Bible study and a men's camp. Through experience, we have recognized the need for leadership training and are, therefore, planning a workshop for Bible club leaders. God is blessing our efforts in finding more effective ways in relating the gospel to the people of Bogota.

BOGOTA CHILDREN'S BIBLE CAMP

January 19 was an exciting day for the children of the Bogota church. We all got together at the church to go down to Cachipay. The two-hour trip was a bit windy and rainy as we rode on the back of the truck, but we had a lot of fun. There were many different activities in camp, such as swimming, hiking and cookouts. The theme of the camp was "Walking with God." We had Bible classes and Bible memorization.



At the end of the three-day camp, we had a contest between different groups. We really studied our Bible verses and lessons! At night we would sit around candles studying because there were problems with the electricity. We also had a puppet show as a result of our craft classes.

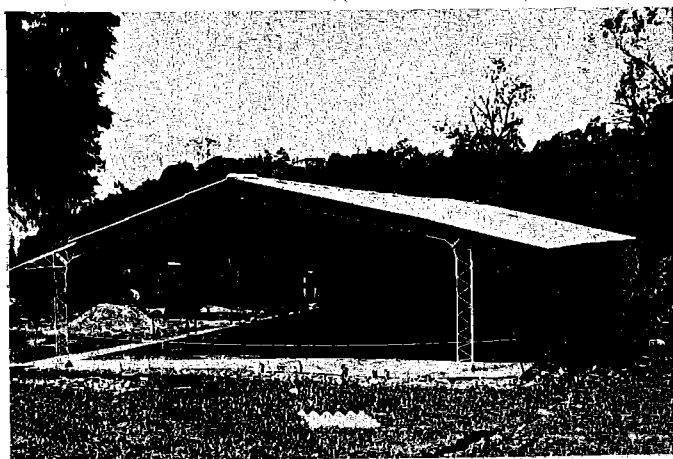
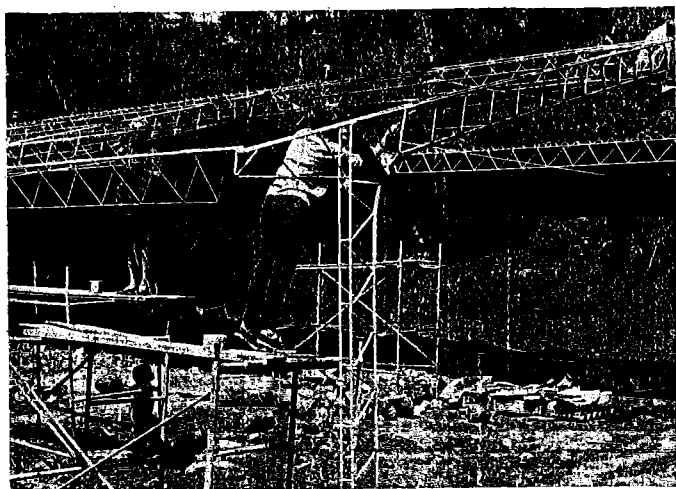
It was an experience that the 34 kids who went will not forget! We learned a lot about walking with God!

NEW DINING HALL CONSTRUCTED

Late in January work was begun on the new dining hall at Cachipay. It is located on the former school playground and football field where there seems to be a minimum of ground shifting. It was hoped that the construction would be completed in six weeks, but due to untimely rains, and other delays, it was prolonged an additional three weeks. Voluntary help from church members, especially from La Mesa, was greatly appreciated.



The Mennonite Youth Retreat over Palm Sunday weekend inaugurated the new facilities. The dining hall enables us to accommodate large groups for church retreats. The grounds and buildings are being made available to the entire evangelical community in Colombia.



The roomy, steel and brick structure will accommodate up to 150 persons. Because of the year-round spring-like climate, the dining area is being left open at the sides. Thus, it can also serve as a sheltered play area for the school children or retreaters in rainy weather.

Within the brick walls is a large kitchen area, a section for washing dishes, a storeroom and a bedroom and bath for the cooks. We are very grateful to Eldon Barger of Avon Lake, Ohio, for drawing the plans for us and for giving us many helpful and imaginative suggestions.



SCOTTISH MISSIONARY CHALLENGES WORKERS



"I'm not going to criticize Martha this morning," said Colin Crawford after reading the Biblical texts relating Martha's three encounters with Jesus. He traced her spiritual development and showed how Jesus was able to help her because of her sincerity in expressing her true feelings.

CACHIPAY CHURCH MOVES FORWARD

In December, Alfonso Castro was elected full-time pastor of the Cachipay congregation. He had served on a pastoral committee for six months prior to that. Mr. Castro is presently a student in the Decentralized Bible Institute. Although he has only been a baptized church member for two years, he brings to his new position enthusiasm,

energy, intelligence and dedication. An increase in church attendance has already been noted and on Palm Sunday eight new members were baptized. May God bless Alfonso and Lilia in their new ministry.

NEW YEAR - NEW DIRECTORS - NEW SCHOOL

Several new developments have taken place on the school scene this year. Direction of the elementary schools in La Mesa and Cachipay was turned over to Colombian teachers and a primary class was begun at Anolaima.

In La Mesa Virginia Terreros is directing the school under the guidance of Vernelle Yoder. Virginia brings to her new position many years of experience in the teaching field. After completing the Ibague Normal School in 1959, she has given ten years of dedicated service to our schools in Cachipay and La Mesa. She is assisted by a full-time staff of three Colombian teachers: Anita Pedraza, Blanca Garzon and Marina Cepeda de Avendano. Leona Daza (nee Schrag) is helping out part-time until the return of Vernelle Yoder.

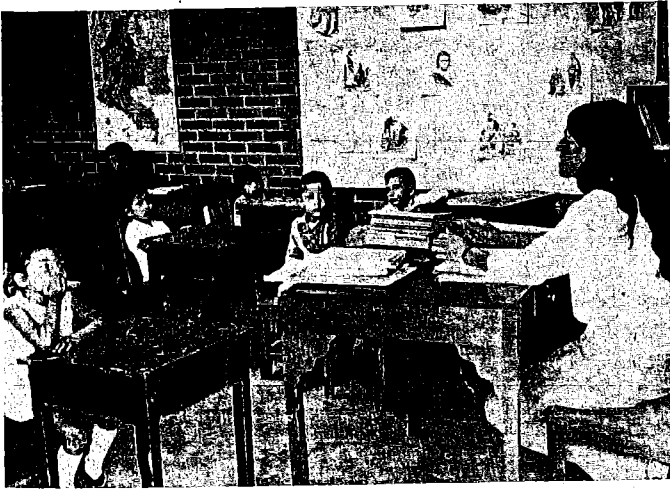


"I'm very pleased with the staff and with the way things are going," says Virginia, the directress. The teachers tend to attribute this excellent relationship to the fact that they have begun regular sharing times. They meet each Monday night to share their problems and concerns and to pray conversationally for each other and their small charges.

La Mesa's biggest problem just now is lack of adequate classroom space. Consequently, numerous applications had to be turned down. In all, 114 students are enrolled.

The school in Cachipay faces a different problem. Due to its location in the country, the community it serves is restricted and attendance has shown a gradual decline over the years. This year 58 students are registered in the elementary school program, and the full-time teaching staff was cut to three. Waldina Rojas is the new directress, assisted by Margaret Ediger. Waldina graduated from Ibague Normal School in 1967 and has had four years of teaching experience. She is assisted by Elisa Prieto and Lilia Castro, both graduates of the Cachipay school.





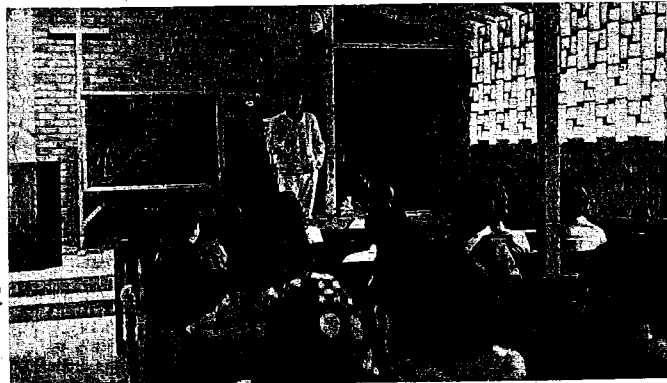
Otilia Lugo teaches 19 first-and second-graders in the church in Anolaima. Opening a school there was a last minute adjustment to the lowered attendance at the Cachipay school, but also an answer to a long-standing request on the part of the Anolaima congregation. The school functions as an annex to the Cachipay school.

YOUTH MEET IN CACHIPAY

From April 3-6 young people from the various Mennonite churches congregated at the Cachipay retreat grounds to participate in the annual youth retreat. The retreat, originally planned for the summer vacations in January, had to be postponed due to the unavailability of speakers at that time and the lack of an adequate dining area. In April the construction of the new dining hall was far enough along to permit the use of the new facilities. The group of retreaters was small, but the blessings great. Under the capable direction of Elisa Prieto, teacher at Cachipay, and Adolfo Palacino, member of the Ibaguë Church, the program was varied and inspirational.



In the morning sessions, Alvaro Pena, Presbyterian university student, led the retreaters to examine how their local youth groups function and helped them to discover clear objectives. His evening messages stressed individual commitment to Jesus Christ for salvation and service. The final message, "Christian Youth and Revolution," touched timely points in view of present conditions in Colombia and the world.



The highlight of the retreat? Was it the small group discussions? The treasure hunt? One of the films? The volleyball matches? Swimming? One of the messages? Browsing in the bookstore? The spontaneous singsongs? Or the campfire dedication service when many made a commitment to Christ? Perhaps each camper would answer differently. However, as Adolfo Palacina said in the last morning meditation, we trust that all will return to their respective homes reflecting Christ in their eyes and in their behavior, showing to others that they received a blessing at the retreat.

KLAASSEN MOVE AND ACTIVITIES

"Hello, is this house for rent?" was the question asked frequently by Glen and Reitha Klaassen. Since giving up their pastoral duties in the Bogota Church on March 1, the Klaassens have left the parsonage and moved to another address. But there is still plenty of work to do! Since 1967, Glen has been the elected executive secretary of the Colombian Mennonite Church. He will be giving more time to this as a personal tie between the various entities of the work, plus helping on a broader basis. As legal representative of the corporation, he will take care of property problems, visas for foreigners, leaving permits for foreigners, etc. The Klaassens hope to more adequately tend to Commission on Overseas Mission business and to frequent visitors. For several years, Glen helped out at the Union Biblical Seminary, Bogota branch. At present, he is teaching courses in pastoral theology and in hermeneutics.

Vernelle Yoder, who has directed the school at La Mesa for a number of years, is just completing a three-month furlough. Besides spending some time with her family in Berne, Indiana, she visited churches in Manitoba and the United States. Vernelle's mother passed away on April 5. Upon her return to Colombia in May, she will take over the administration of the bookstore in La Mesa while the Wiebes are on furlough. She will continue to teach in the La Mesa school on a part-time basis, as well as provide guidance for the new directress, Virginia Terreros.

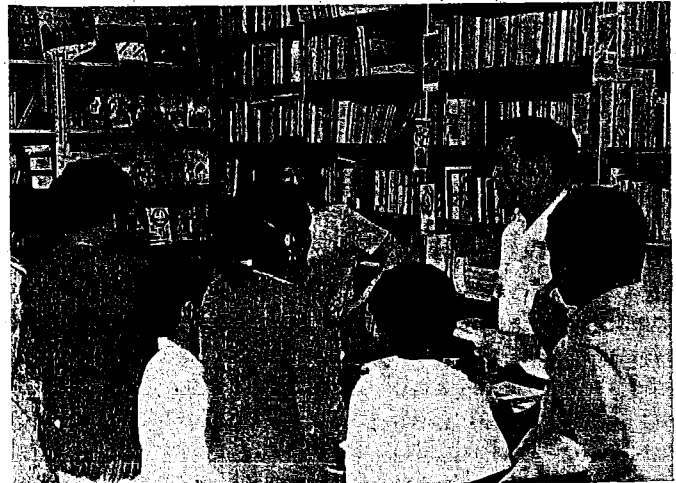


WIEBES TAKE YEAR FURLOUGH

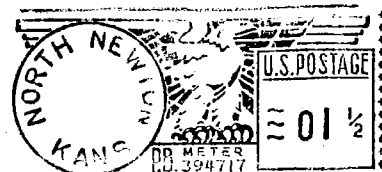


Rush Hour at the Bookstore

Eight months ago, Pastor Glen Klaassen resigned, effective March 1, 1971, having served for three years. A church pastoral committee is looking for a pastor. In the meantime, the congregation has named a pulpit committee of five members to lead the Sunday services. A special speaker will be invited every third Sunday of each month. Mrs. Oliva de Bastidas, a deaconess, will serve as office coordinator two afternoons each week. Several members have offered to help with typing the church bulletins.
